There are thousands of nets, each with its own purpose. Any group of licensed amateur radio operators can have their own net for any purpose they choose. The Farm net every night on 75 meters is a group of widely scattered people keeping in touch for fellowship and information. The Utah Beehive Net daily at 12:30 mountain time on 7272 is announced as a traffic net. Traffic is passed but is scarce. It seems to be mostly for fun and keeping in touch for people who have time to be on a net in midday.

Most Ham clubs have nets and announce their own purposes for them. Probably all have the purpose of feilowship, information, recognition of the accomplishments of members, etc. Most include message handling in their function. Many hope to use the net as a means of educating members in technical subjects or preparations for public service. Nets are boring if there is nothing but a roll call and no discussion or information.

Nets are essential to tie people together who have similar interests. The key element is knowing each other, knowing the interests of the group and advancing those interests.

The Bridgerland Net has all of the purposes mentioned above but has one added requirement: Training must be sufficient to justify to Cache County their investment in funds and authority to use the Mount Logan location for the repeater. The main elements of that training are for the members to know each other by name, call and location, to know how to operate in emergencies to help the Sheriff and his deputies and to learn to be prepared with equipment when needed.

The only way we can accomplish this is if every amateur will take the time to check in and participate in the Nets, and other training activities. Over the next few months there will be plenty of opportunities for amateurs to help out and receive valuable training. Don't become a just a 72 repeater user, become a trained, involved, and active user, ready to help when needed.

CALLING 911 FOR AMATEURS

The day may come when you will be required to call 911 from your radio. What will you do? What is the proper way to make the call?

Let's say you're cruising along up Logan canyon and you come across an accident. First find out how many may be hurt and offer immediate first aid to those who need to be stabilized. Check the repeater to see if it is busy. If it is, you may need to call break or give your call and tell them that you have an emergency. On our auto patch, calling 911 is just like any phone patch you may have made to your home. Give your call sign and announce that you're using the auto patch. Press the "star" key to bring it up, then dial 911.

When the dispatcher answers, they will say "911". The first thing you need to tell them is your NAME, not your call sign. Your call sign does not mean anything to them. Give your name and tell them you're on a ham radio auto patch, then unkey and see if they copied your transmission. It may be helpful to use the word "OVER" at the end of each transmission in this situation.

You may have to remind them that you can't hear them when you're transmitting. They will ask you what you need. Tell them that you are at a traffic accident and that there are injuries and how many are hurt. Check to see if they copied that information. Then tell them where you are with an address or that you are in Logan canyon and give a mile post number or a very good description of your location.

Try to keep your transmissions short, they may be trying to ask you for more information. They may ask for a call back number. Tell them there isn't one but ask if there is another ham on frequency that is near a phone who could function as a contact point for a call back. They could then contact you by radio to relay any messages. ...

Chances are though, if you gave a good description of the accident and your location, they won't need to call back and help will be on the way knowing exactly where they're going. Tell them thanks and good-bye and hang up by pressing the "pound" key. Then if you can, without being in the way, help all you can with the injured or help with traffic control. But be careful not to get run over, you can't help if you're hurt. 911 can also and should be used to report road hazards, stranded motorist's, impaired drivers, livestock, etc. anything that looks like a hazard to the public.
