MAY CLUB MEETING

Army MARS was on hand at the May club meeting to explain to local amateurs the purpose and mission of Army Mars. MARS stands for Military Affiliated Radio System. There are branches of MARS in the Army, Navy, Marines, and Air Force. The main mission of MARS is to support the military in communications in times of need.

MARS members must be licensed amateur radio operators, but use military frequencies to conduct their operations. Those frequencies are just outside of the amateur and most all of the radios are modifiable to operate on MARS frequencies. MARS has nets every day. Locally nets are on both HF and VHF bands. VHF nets are on the 143.990 repeater. The input frequency is 148.010 (What an offset!). For new members, nets are conducted every week to provide basic training. New members are required to pass a test. There are also administrative, digital communications, and emergency training nets.

One benefit of being a MARS member is that surplus military equipment can be acquired for use by members. "This is a nice benefit but should not be a reason for joining MARS stated Mike Lawyer", state director for MARS. Mike Lawyer, along with Steve Carver, and Dave Baar gave the presentation and answered questions. Neal Erickson is the local area coordinator for MARS.

As usual a great treat was devoured after the meeting. This time it was spud nuts, and they were yummy!
