Ham Profile Bill Neville

Bill Neville WA7KMF, was raised in Idaho Falls, Idaho. He began his ham radio career through the Eagle Rock Amateur Radio Club in Idaho Falls. He received his first license about 1968 and sometime later passed his Conditional (General) ham exam. He later upgraded to the Advanced class license, the class he holds today. He was active in Field Day activities with the club and attended the WIMU Hamfest held at Mack's Inn, Idaho. While in Idaho Falls, he worked at one of the local radio and television stations, KID. He learned many of the workings of the broadcasting business and much of the electronics involved at the studio and transmitter sites.

After graduating high school in 1971, Bill traveled to Logan to attend school at Utah State University majoring in Electrical Engineering. While going to school he worked at KVNU as a disk jockey and later became the chief engineer. Several changes in FCC broadcast rules occurred during his stay at KVNU.

Bill was also active on 2 meter FM from his car. His small dorm room at the East High rise did not have enough room for radios or an antenna. As part of his 2 meter activity, Bill became interested in the 2 way radio business and started a company in Logan called Cache Communications. This business survived for a few years and then Bill opted to start working for Motorola Communications and Electronics in Ogden at the companies' repair shop. After training on Motorola radios and with the development of Specialized Mobile Radio (SMR), Bill and a salesman from Motorola left the company and went to work in Logan for ...
