AC70 Repeater System News

The Utah VHF Society is a group dedicated to maintaining and operating a system of repeaters in the state of Utah. Dues are \$10.00 per year and can be sent to PO Box 482 Bountiful, UT 84011-0482. The Utah VHF Society holds a swap meet annually, usually on a Saturday in February. FINDING OUT YOUR NEW CALL

In December of 1994 the FCC adopted new rules that allow a newly-licensed operator to get on the air as soon as a call-sign has been issued. Previously, a new licensee could not operate until his printed license arrived by mail. If you have recently passed the test for a new license or an upgrade, you can find out your new callsign and start operating as soon as it has been issued. Start checking about five days after the exam session. Here are ways to check:

- 1. Call the FCC at (888) 225-5322.
- 2. Call the ARRL at (860) 594-0300 between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. Mountain time.
- Check the callsign server (see below) maintained by the University of Arkansas at Littlerock and search using your name and state.

If you include your middle initial, do not include a period. http://www.ualr.edu/~hamradio/callsign.html

4. Check the callsign database (see below) maintained by the publishers of the "QRZ" CD-ROM. In the portion of the form for "First Name", be sure to enter your first name and middle initial exactly as they were entered on your application form, but with no period. For example "JOHN B" would be a typical entry. http://www.qrz.com/name.html http://www.qrz.com/name.html
