
Ham Profile by Boyd Humpherys W7MOY

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# What do you take on Field Day?

Tent, poles, stakes, heater, fuel, light fixtures, tables, chairs, extension cords, hammers.

At least 2 transceivers, one with a good CW filter, key, keyer, mike, transmatch, power supplies, speakers, earphones, audio doubler, assorted adapters and connectors for coax, and audio stuff. Especially a 1/4 inch stereo, and 1/4 inch mono plug for hooking up key or keyer, and barrel connectors for hooking coax together.

Two computers to log on. Logging software. I suggest you keep the logs on floppies; one for each band. Surge suppressors. RS 232 connector, cord, and interface, if you want to send CW exchanges with the computer.

Paper and pencils. Copy of the rules, both FCC and Field Day. Demo stuff and brochures, if you are going for the public awareness bonus points.

Antennas, coax, masts, twine. Extra wire and insulators. (In case someone wants to build an antenna.) Ground rod. Wire for grounding.

Soldering iron, solder, assorted tools, like screw drivers, pliers etc., propane torch.

Power plant (s) and cables to hook it up. Fuel, oil. Extension cords to hook up lights, rigs, computers etc.

Water (it is a dry camp), munchies, mosquito dope (there are lots of mosquitoes) sunscreen, sleeping bag, cot, first aid kit, prescription drugs\_chair, plate and utensils, hat, coat, camping gear. Something to amuse the kids. Firewood.

Something for the pot luck dinner. At least enough to share with 8-10 people.

Anything you can't survive without. Cokes, Smokes?

#### **Everything else you forgot! HAW!**

Generally we set the tent up before the actual day, sometimes the Thursday before, whenever at least 6 people will be there to help, it's a big tent. The tent is stored at Ted McArthur's.

We need two port-a-potties, someone with a trailer that they can be left on and a truck to pull them.

Jim will bring the wood stove like last year, ask everyone to bring an extra arm full of wood for the stove in the tent as well as what they want for their personal fires. It really made the difference in being comfortable during the night.

# Your GPS gets automatic upgrade!

To all Utah APRS users:

"It's rare that someone can press a button and make something you already own worth more, but that's exactly what's happening today." -PRESIDENT BILL CLINTON

As of midnight tonight (May 1st, 2000), civilian GPS receivers will \*automatically\* become MUCH more accurate because the government is discontinuing the requirement of Selective Availability (SA) in the GPS system. I spoke with David Turner at the Interagency GPS Executive Board (IGEB) in Washington D.C. today and he confirmed this fact. They are obviously very excited about this turn of events at the IGEB. Mr. Turner said, "This is something that is long overdue for civilian users."

Mr. Turner told me SA is not something built into your GPS receiver, rather it is an algorithm built into the GPS system. So when SA is turned off tonight, according to Mr. Turner, our existing GPS receivers will become nearly as accurate as the military receivers. We won't have access to some of the Atmospheric Degradation Correction information the Military uses but even that may change in 2003 when the government will release a second GPS frequency for civilian use. This second frequency will allow us to receive addition "correction" information to get us increased accuracy. But Mr. Turner stated that the improvement in accuracy which we will realize tonight is HUGE and probably much more significant than anything that may be done to improve the civilian GPS service in the future.

APRS users should be very interested in this information. It is a major breakthrough for this aspect of the Amateur Radio hobby. Our ability to track APRS enabled vehicles will be tremendously improved beginning tonight. We'll be able to get much more accurate fixes and won't see our cars "dancing" all over the APRS screen when they are parked somewhere.

#### STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT REGARDING THE UNITED STATES' DECISION TO STOP DEGRADING GLOBAL POSITIONING SYSTEM ACCURACY

"Today, I am pleased to announce that the United States will stop the intentional degradation of the Global Positioning System (GPS) signals available to the public beginning at midnight tonight. We call this degradation feature Selective Availability (SA)."
