
Ham Profile By Boyd Humpherys W7MOY

Air Force and garnered a masters in EE from the University of Illinois while in the service. He relates some interesting experiences in the military with the Air Force Cambridge Research Labs in Low Frequency propagation. He was involved in work with LF propagation characteristics with the airborne command post aircraft. You may recall in prior years we had military surveillance aircraft in the air 24 hrs. a day and instantaneous communications with our nuclear fleet and other elements of the military was a top priority. One such project involved the use of Low Frequencies, 10KHZ and above. The aircraft deployed some 23,000 feet of 3/16" flexible cable, towing a drogue chute to keep the wire stable. When questioned about radiated powers, he mentioned that the Navy at one time used 200 KW, and the Air Force used 20 KW or so. Talk about mobile QRM, now we know where all that S9 level QRM on 160 & 75 meters came from back then. How would any of you enjoy the likes of that aeronautical mobile shack at 40,000 feet and continuously changing QTH at 500 mph.

I had to ask the obvious question. What happens when an aircraft comes in for a landing and the 5 mile long wire antenna hasn't been retracted? I could see miles and miles of fences, telephone, power lines and other stuff getting yanked across the country side at supersonic speeds. He admitted that would be quite a spectacle, but assured me those contingencies were planned for. A good portion of the flights were over water and means were available to efficiently detach the cable should that ever become necessary.

He had been out in this area quite a few times before moving out from the East coast. His Grandfather, Charles Hirst taught in the Chemistry Dept. at USU many years back, and His father grew up in the area. George grew to love the valley, spent several summers backpacking in the Wind Rivers, skiing our slopes in the winters and enjoying the wide open spaces. He cast about for some living space where he could see the "lay of the land" and what better spot to do so than was found in Cache Valley's largest community, area wise, Lewiston. He found what he wanted, a 106 acre spread on west center in Lewiston in 97 and moved out in 98. He is into radio control model aircraft and claims he needs that much land for several runways for his birds.

He is up to his neck in a rather involved remodel job, adding a sizable addition on the East side of his present home. He didn't let us down when he pointed out the "New shack" room on the East with a great view of the mountains and all the runways for the RC craft. He also stuck his shoe in the ground at the side of the house and said, here is where the tower goes. He rounded up some 15-16 hams in the area for last years Y2K exercise. A goodly number for our farming neighbors to the north.

Welcome to Cache Valley, George.

The amateur radio satellite Phase 3D (now officially AMSAT-Oscar 40) was launched on an Ariane 5 rocket. It is now safely in its intended original orbit. AO-40 is the culmination of a ten-year long project to orbit a sophisticated, highly programmable communications platform for amateur radio use. Over the next 250 days engines on board the satellite will gradually place it in its intended final orbit.
